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Chromosomally Enhanced: What's Your Superpower? New Film Premieres for the Community at Emagine Novi on July 26th, 2022

WIXOM - The documentary film by Keith Famie and his Visionalist Entertainment Productions team, *Chromosomally Enhanced: What's Your Superpower?* shows up close what life is really like for individuals with Down syndrome and their families. The film features Michigan residents of all ages and stages of life with Down syndrome, as well as community organizations that aid these families.

The premise behind this documentary is that after spending time with children with Down syndrome, Famie came to the conclusion that their superpower is that extra chromosome, which gives them the ability to see the world through rose-colored glasses. "They all have a sincere, caring, empathic, way in how they see the rest of humanity spreading joy and smiles to all they meet, something the world could use a big dose of right now," Famie said.

After almost 3 years, thanks to Paul Glantz and the Novi Emagine Theater team, the film *Chromosomally Enhanced: What's your Superpower?* had its debut to a full theater of 320 guests that included eleven of the fifteen featured stars, their family members, and some notable community leaders, including Jim "JJ" Johnson from WOMC radio and singer/songwriter Jill Jack whose song, "Super Hero" closes the film. Retired Detroit Lions player, Eric Hipple, who is featured in the film, opened the evening with insightful comments about what can be learned from those living and thriving with Down syndrome.

One of the big highlights of the evening was the poster signing with our featured superheroes. Smiles, smiles, and more smiles were had by all.

The closing evening comments were filled with positive emotion and enthusiasm for the world to see this film of those living and thriving with Down syndrome among us.

Pre-COVID, Famie filmed with four Michigan Special Olympics individuals on the Plymouth Canton Stars powerlifting team: Kyle Siarto A.K.A. Iceman, Sean Bowers A.K.A. Tank, Kevin Welgosh A.K.A. Hollywood, and Robby Heil A.K.A. Sparty. The team was practicing to compete in the 2020 Michigan Special Olympics State Summer Games scheduled to take place the last week of May at Central Michigan University. The pandemic took this opportunity away and halted production for what many thought would end the production altogether. However, Famie was determined to keep this production going. As part of the closing scene to the film, Famie envisioned something iconic and interactive. In October 2020, nine featured individuals and local first responders from the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, White Lake Township Police Department, Novi Police Department, Ypsilanti Township Fire Department, Livingston County K-9 Unit, and the Willow Run ARFF, as well as two of Detroit's favorite football icons, Eric Hipple and Lomas Brown, all came together, like superheroes, to physically pull a 33,000lbs B-17 Yankee Lady Bomber, thanks to Willow Run Airport/Yankee Air Museum.

As part of the story, Famie wanted to incorporate a segment in the film about employment. Famie and the VEP team filmed with Michael Renkiewicz, 31. Renkiewicz has worked at Kroger in Novi, Michigan for 5 years. Also, Bracha Greenes, 27, an employee at Dakota Bread Company, a gourmet Jewish bakery founded by Levi and Bassie Shemtov of the Friendship Circle. And Anna Perzyk who works at Arby's in Waterford.

Also featured in the film is board-certified medical geneticist, Dr. Skotko, the Emma Campbell Endowed Chair on Down Syndrome at Massachusetts General Hospital. As a national leading doctor for children with cognitive and developmental disabilities, Dr. Skotko brings an important element to the film, providing answers to the technical and medical questions.

Additionally, Jill Jack, an American singer-songwriter based in Ferndale, Michigan, wrote a song with co-writer Brian Lord called, "Super Hero." Famie and his team filmed a short music video to the song with nine featured individuals that are shown in the film.
